changes since NEII RG #01 from initial member feedback. The NEII Roadmap is the primary communication tool that provides an overview of the drivers, benefits, the programme organising framework, deliverables and their timing. It provides stakeholders with a view into programme and where possible, participant activities. It will be updated annually as the NEII evolves. Where partners have clarity and resource commitment in place in regard to their NEII-related activities, these will be included into the Roadmap with reference made to the contributing organisation. In parallel the team will develop a register of current and proposed activities. The register would act as a resource for members to learn of related activities across partner organisations and would be tabled at future meetings of the NEIIRG. Pending final feedback and inclusion of participant content, the Roadmap will be released at the next NEII RG meeting and publicly available in early 2015. **Discussion and** Members discussed the need to review the governance structure described Questions in the Roadmap in light of the Social Architecture work undertaken by Paul Box noting that there is a formal connection between the Department of the Environment and the Bureau of Meteorology through the Joint Steering Committee (JSC), while governance arrangements are different between the NPEI Joint Steering Committee and the AG EIAG. Members noted that member inclusions to the Roadmap or activities register should not be restricted to the IT Build focus area, but could also touch on Communication, Engagement, Data Management and Policy and Framework activities. The concept of the NEII as a repository (hosting service for specific data) requires further expansion including the concept of core Bureau-hosted components versus partner components. Members were encouraged to contribute content to the roadmap ahead of NEII-RG #03 where they had resource clarity, or alternatively through the activities register where activities were early in their genesis and not ready to be shared publically. **ACTION ACTION 2.5** Members to provide secretariat content into the NEII Roadmap (across all five focus areas) or populate the activities register ahead of the NEII RG #03. Item 2.6 **NEII Programme update Item 2.7 Member Updates Agriculture** – Are currently exploring the role of data models, IT priorities and developing a data strategy for the next financial year. ABS – A review of the Environmental Accounts work is soon to be released. An ABS officer has been out posted to the MDBA to improve data flow between agencies and this collaboration will produce a report early in the ALA – MERIT tool has been completed for the Department of the Environment and is being actively used to support national programmes. ANDS - Working on an input to a data registry, which could be included in the NEII Activities Register. Leading a project to facilitate the development of vocabularies across multiple partners.
